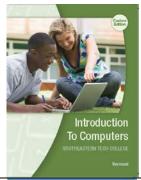

REQUIRED SUPPLIES & SOFTWARE: one USB Flash Drive, Windows 7 or Windows 8 Operating System, Internet connection with browser as Mozilla Firefox 2 (recommended) or Google Chrome. Office 2013 (Word, PowerPoint, Excel, and Access) IDS can be used for Office 2013; however, recommend you purchase a 180 day (6mth) full evaluation version from the STC Bookstore for \$35.00 due to variety of home internet connections. Although students can use their smart phones and tablets to access their online course(s), exams, discussions, assignments, and other graded activities should be performed on a personal computer. Neither ANGEL nor GVTC provide technical support for issues relating to the use of a smart phone or tablet so students are advised to not rely on these devices to take an online course.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Introduces the fundamental concepts, terminology, and operations necessary to use computers. Emphasis is placed on basic functions and familiarity with computer use.

MAJOR COURSE COMPETENCIES/COURSE OUTLINE: Topics include: Computer Terminology, Introduction to the Windows Environment, Introduction to Internet and Email, Introduction to Word Processing Software, Introduction to Database Software, Introduction to Spreadsheet Software, and Introduction to Presentation Software.

PREREQUISITE(S): none

GENERAL EDUCATION CORE COMPETENCIES: STC has identified the following general education core competencies that graduates will attain:

All students pursuing a degree, a diploma, or a Technical Certificate of Credit with a General Education component will be required to pass the General Education Competency Exams prior to graduation.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS (Online): Online courses require students to be academically engaged each week doing course related activities. The completion dates of these activities will be used to determine a student's last date of attendance in the event a student withdraws or receives an F in a course. A student's last date of attendance can have a negative effect on his/her financial aid and academic progress. Students are responsible for policies and procedures included in the STC Catalog and Student Handbook.

Students are expected to complete all work required by the instructor, and to attend the required proctored campus exam. Students are also expected to complete all chapter work, project assignments, discussion boards and tests on the dates specified on the attached calendar.

Students will have at least one week to complete tests and assignments. All tests and assignments are due at midnight on Monday of each week. Exceptions to the due dates of assignments due to jury duty, military duty, court duty, or required job training will be made at the discretion of the instructor. Assignments will be submitted via the Remote Lab Information Delivery System (CITRIX – IDS) or emailed to the instructor, Angel, and SAM. Late assignments will not be accepted. Students who miss any assignment, test, project, or discussion board will receive a grade of 0.

Discussion Board topics must be appropriate to the class. Spelling and Grammar are considered part of the grade. Posted content should fully answer the question. Short 1 to 2 sentence posts will not be sufficient. See Discussion Board grading rubric below. **Complete your initial post by Wednesday and all replies by the Monday due date.**

EMAILS: All emails should be sent to me using **Owl Mail.** Make sure that you always type your name and class in the subject line of every email you send me so I know which class you are in. For example: COMP1000 Dasher

CHECKING GRADES: A grade book is made available in the ANGEL course on the main page when students log in. This grade book is for students to review and is continuously updated throughout the semester. Students can RUN a REPORT of their grades at any time to see the individual grades for each assignment. Students are to keep in mind that if assigned a grade of zero that these grades are not automatically counted in the current averages shown until instructor post those grades manually so averages could seem higher at the time before posting these grades. Students are responsible for knowing how to average their grades, not the instructor. The overall percentage averages should display in the grade book to help track course progress.

No Harm No Foul Policy: It is the student's responsibility to drop courses during the first three days by completing a withdrawal form with a Counselor in Student Affairs. If a student comes to class during the first three days or any day during this time, the student will be dropped with no penalty only if they have completed the Withdrawal Form with Student Affairs by the close of business on the third business day of the quarter. (For Fall semester, that day will be August 17, 2016.) The student must formally withdraw from classes in order to receive the no harm-no foul benefit. If the student shows up the first day but does not return, the instructor will drop the student after the attendance period but that will not come under the no harm-no foul policy. The student will be charged for the class unless he/she formally withdraws

DROPPING COURSES BEFORE THE CLASS HAS BEGUN: Students wishing to withdraw from one or all courses prior to the first day of class need to go to Banner Web and drop their classes. Please note that a registration access number will be needed as well as a student's ID number and PIN. If the registration access number is unknown, the student will need to contact the registrar.

in Student Affairs and complete a Student Withdrawal Form. A grade of "W" is assigned when the student completes the withdrawal form from the course(s). After the 65% portion of the semester, the student has earned the right to a letter grade and will receive a grade for the course. Abandoning a course(s) instead of following official withdrawal procedures may result in a grade of "F" being assigned.

PROCTORED EVENT REQUIREMENT: In order to validate student identity for all online courses, students enrolled in online courses are required to complete one proctored event per online course. The proctored event will be administered on two separate days during the semester—once on the Vidalia campus and once on the Swainsboro campus and will be monitored by the instructor or another STC employee. The proctored event may be a major exam, assignment, or presentation, etc. that will count a minimum of 20% of the course grade. Students must attend one of the scheduled proctored sessions and will need to make arrangements with work, childcare, etc. The specific dates of the proctored event are scheduled on the Lesson Plan/Calendar for the online course. Students living further than 75 miles from either campus who cannot come to Southeastern Tech for the event must secure an approved proctoring site. The site and the proctor must meet Southeastern Technical College's requirements (instructor will provide more information and necessary forms if this is the case). Note: Students taking proctored events off campus will utilize the Proctor Scheduling and Approval Form found under the Proctoring Tab in ANGEL and submit the completed form to their instructor for approval a minimum of two weeks prior to the proctored event. If approved, the instructor will notify the proctor.

Students arranging off-campus proctoring must take the event on **one of** the originally scheduled **days**. Students who do not complete the proctored event as scheduled must submit a valid documented excuse within three business days after the scheduled event. If the excuse is approved, students must make arrangements with the instructor to makeup/reschedule the missed event. The penalty and makeup instructions will be at the instructor's discretion. Proctored events will be given between weeks 10 and 13 for fall and spring semesters and between weeks 6 and 8 for summer semester. **Students who do not complete the proctored event will receive an F in the course.**

As published on STC's website, any expenses incurred to obtain a proctor will be the responsibility of the student; however, students are not charged a proctoring fee when taking the proctored exam on the campus of Southeastern Tech. Most of Georgia's technical colleges do not charge to proctor exams for students enrolled in other TCSG colleges. Students who are enrolled at Southeastern Technical College and live out of the state of Georgia or out of the country could incur a proctoring charge. However, in that instance, the instructor would assist the student in locating the least expensive proctor.

The required proctored event for this class is scheduled on the following dates and times: Swainsboro Campus, (11/28/16 at 2:00 pm, room TBA) and Vidalia Campus, (11/29/16 at 2:00 pm Room TBA). Students must be on-time in order to take the exam. The proctored exam is listed in the lesson plan-- COMP 1000 COMPETENCY FINAL EXAM.
