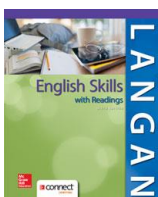

Students will be required to read, to acknowledge, and to sign the ENGLISH 1010 Co-Requisite Acknowledgement form.

In the event the instructor is absent for ENGL 1010 or ENGL 0090 or both classes, students should work on the assignments in the *MyWritingLab*. Attendance will be verified using the *MyWritingLab* activity log. To receive attendance credit, the student's activity log must indicate at least 75 minutes of time on task of the *MyWritingLab* assignments. The instructor reserves the right to mark a student present according to the amount of assignments completed on the date.

CELL PHONE POLICY:
