COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course examines the critical issues involved in the survival of a police officer in all aspects including their physical, mental, and psychological wellbeing. Emphasis is placed on personal protection skills, defensive tactics, handcuffing techniques, patrol tactics, vehicle stops, building searches and use of force.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS:

- Class attendance is a very important aspect of a student's success in this course. Responsibility for class attendance rests with the student. Regular and punctual attendance at all scheduled classes is expected. Students are expected to complete all work required by the instructor as described in the individual course syllabus.
- Students will be required to keep a notebook for this course. The notebook will be a work-in-progress throughout the semester. Students will be given an assignment list which will need to be completed by the date listed on the lesson plan. The assignments will be based on current criminal justice events, healthy living techniques, stress reduction techniques, exercise regiments, and YouTube videos documenting police officer survival. The notebook will be graded twice throughout the semester. Each item in the notebook will be graded individually. The notebook will be graded based on the following:
 - 1. Completion of the weekly topic
 - 2. Grammar, spelling, punctuation
 - 3. Detail/Content pertaining to the weekly topic
 - 4. Completed by due dates

- The instructor may give additional assignments and assign the points for those assignments as deemed appropriate.
- Students will be encouraged to participate in class discussions and provide their opinion on the topic of
 discussion. The responses should include why you do or do not agree with your classmates responses.
 Students are encouraged to provide their honest opinions even if it is in disagreement with fellow students
 but the responding student should be professional in his/her response to his/her classmate. Students will be
 constructive in their class discussions.
- Students will be required to participate in some physical activities throughout the semester. If a student is not able to participate in the assigned activity due to medical or other legitimate reasons, an alternative assignment will be given to meet the required Lab time for the course. Documentation must be provided to the instructor in order for a student to be excused from a Lab assignment. Students will be advised of the Lab exercise on Monday of each week and will be expected to dress appropriately to participate in the Lab exercise on Wednesday of each week. (Lab exercise may include but are not limited to: walking, aerobic exercises, health eating, yoga, handcuffing, building searches, defensive tactics (Redman), etc.)
- Students will receive a 7 point deduction from his/her overall class participation grade for each Wednesday lab activity that is missed.
- There will be 4 exams given throughout the semester. Exams will cover material from the respective chapters. See lesson plan part of the syllabus for more information. It is the responsibility of the student to check the lesson plan and be prepared for the exam on the date specified.

ATTENDANCE GUIDELINES: Class attendance is a very important aspect of a student's success. Being absent from class prevents students from receiving the full benefit of a course and also interrupts the learning process. Southeastern Technical College considers both tardiness and leaving early as types of absenteeism. Responsibility for class attendance rests with the student. Regular and punctual attendance at all scheduled classes is required for student success. Students will be expected to complete all work required by the instructor as described in the individual course syllabus.

Instructors have the right to give unannounced quizzes/assignments. Students who miss an unannounced quiz or assignment will receive a grade of 0. Students who stop attending class, but do not formally withdraw, may receive a grade of F and face financial aid repercussions in upcoming semesters.

Instructors are responsible for determining whether missed work may be made up and the content and dates for makeup work is at the discretion of the instructor.

Students will not be withdrawn by an instructor for attendance; however, all instructors will keep records of graded assignments and student participation in course activities. The completion dates of these activities will be used to determine a student's last date of attendance in the event a student withdraws, stops attending, or receives an F in a course.

WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURE: Students wishing to officially withdraw from a course(s) or all courses after the drop/add period and prior to the 65% portion of the semester (date will be posted on the school calendar) must speak

with a Career Counselor in Student Affairs and complete a Student Withdrawal Form. A grade of "W" is assigned when the student completes the withdrawal form from the course.

Students who are dropped from courses due to attendance (see your course syllabus for attendance policy) after drop/add until the 65% point of the semester will receive a "W" for the course. Abandoning a course(s) instead of following official withdrawal procedures may result in a grade of 'F' being assigned.

After the 65% portion of the semester, the student will receive a grade for the course. (Please note: A zero will be given for all missed assignments.)

There is no refund for partial reduction of hours. Withdrawals may affect students' eligibility for financial aid for the current semester and in the future, so a student must also speak with a representative of the Financial Aid Office to determine any financial penalties that may be accessed due to the withdrawal. All grades, including grades of 'W', will count in attempted hour calculations for the purpose of Financial Aid.

Remember - Informing your instructor that you will not return to his/her course does not satisfy the approved withdrawal procedure outlined above.

MAKEUP GUIDELINES (Tests, quizzes, homework, etc...): Students are required to make up any missed tests, quizzes and homework assignments on the day of their return. Failure to do so will result in a grade of zero. (See the Student Requirements section above for more information.)

--First Offense--

Student will be assigned a grade of "0" for the test or assignment. Instructor keeps a record in course/program files and notes as first offense. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.

--Second Offense--

Student is given a grade of "WF" for the course in which offense occurs. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus indicating a "WF" has been issued as a result of second offense. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.

-- Third Offense--

Student is given a grade of "WF" for the course in which the offense occurs. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus indicating a "WF" has been issued as a result of second offense. The Vice President for Student Affairs, or designee, will notify the student of suspension from college for a specified period of time. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.
