REQUIRED SUPPLIES: Each student should have the following: Long Sleeve Shirt or welding jacket, pair of work boots, welding helmet, gloves, safety glasses, 4 ½" grinder, vice grips, wire brush and Klines or heavy duty wire cutters. You will not be permitted to borrow from the Instructor or your fellow classmates.

PRE-REQUISITES: All Required, WELD 1000 Introduction to Welding Technology and WELD 1110 Gas Tungsten Arc Welding

CO-REQUISITES: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Provides knowledge of theory, safety practices, inert gas, equipment, and techniques for successful advanced gas tungsten arc welding. Qualification tests, all positions, are used in the evaluating of student progress toward making advanced industrial standard welds. Topics include: GTAW safety and health practices, shielding gases, metal cleaning procedures, GTAW machines and set up, selection of filler rods, GTAW Weld positions, and advanced production of GTAW beads, bead patterns, and joints.

COURSE OUTLINE: GTAW Safety and Health practices, Shielding Gases, Metal Cleaning procedures, GTAW machines and set up, Selection of Filler Rods, GTAW Weld positions, and Advanced Production of GTAW Beads, Bead Patterns, and Joints.

Students will not be withdrawn by an instructor for attendance; however, all instructors will keep records of graded assignments and student participation in course activities. The completion dates of these activities will be used to determine a student's last

date of attendance in the event a student withdraws, stops attending, or receives an F in a course.

SPECIFIC ABSENCES: Provisions for Instructional Time missed because of documented absences due to jury duty, military duty, court duty, or required job training will be made at the discretion of the instructor. For each unexcused absence, one grade point will be deducted from your overall GPA.

WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURE: Students wishing to officially withdraw from a course(s) or all courses after the drop/add period and prior to the 65% portion of the semester (date will be posted on the school calendar) must speak with a Career Counselor in Student Affairs and complete a Student Withdrawal Form. A grade of "W" is assigned when the student completes the withdrawal form from the course.

Students who are dropped from courses due to attendance (see your course syllabus for attendance policy) after drop/add until the 65% point of the semester will receive a "W" for the course. Abandoning a course(s) instead of following official withdrawal procedures may result in a grade of 'F' being assigned.

After the 65% portion of the semester, the student will receive a grade for the course. (Please note: A zero will be given for all missed assignments.)

There is no refund for partial reduction of hours. Withdrawals may affect students' eligibility for financial aid for the current semester and in the future, so a student must also speak with a representative of the Financial Aid Office to determine any financial penalties that may be accessed due to the withdrawal. All grades, including grades of 'W', will count in attempted hour calculations for the purpose of Financial Aid.

Remember - Informing your instructor that you will not return to his/her course does not satisfy the approved withdrawal procedure outlined above.

MAKEUP GUIDELINES: Makeup test will be given on the following class meeting date with an acceptable excuse approved by the instructor; any test not made up will result in the student receiving a zero.

Any assignment(s) not completed will result in a zero. If you fall behind on any assignments or cannot produce a visually acceptable weldment, a due date will be given. If on the given due date, you are still unable to produce a visually acceptable weldment, you will receive a zero for that assignment.

--Second Offense--

Student is given a grade of "WF" for the course in which offense occurs. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus indicating a "WF" has been issued as a result of second offense. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.

-- Third Offense--

Student is given a grade of "WF" for the course in which the offense occurs. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus indicating a "WF" has been issued as a result of second offense. The Vice President for Student Affairs, or designee, will notify the student of suspension from college for a specified period of time. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.
