COVID-19 SELF-REPORTING REQUIREMENT

Students, who test positive for COVID-19 or who have been exposed to a COVID-19 positive person, are required to self-report using the <u>COVID 19 Health Reporting Form</u>. STC CAMPUS DRESS CODE (CLASSROOM, LAB)

Students will be asked to dress in professional nursing attire while in the classroom, skills lab and clinical. This will mean students will be expected to dress appropriately each day. Students will be asked to wear scrub pants and a t-shirt or a full scrub set (your choice of style and color) to class/lab each day. Students should wear shoes that are comfortable and have an enclosed heel and toe. A great example is a tennis shoe or nursing clog. Hair should be pulled back and secured during lab.

ASSIGNMENTS AND EXAMS

Students are expected to complete all daily assignments and exams. A unit exam average of 70% or above must be obtained in order to take the final exam. Students that do not obtain an exam average of 70% will not be able to take the final exam and will receive a WP or WF for all PNSG courses in which they are enrolled and will not be able to progress in the program.

No assignment opportunities will be given for extra credit. Any unit exam grade will be entered as is to the nearest 10th. No scores will be rounded (up or down). *For example; exam has 60 questions and each question will be worth 1.66 pts.* The student correctly answers 52 questions out of 60. 52 correct answers x 1.66 =

86.32. The grade will be recorded as 86.3. This rule applies to every grade issued during the semester. All final averages will be recorded as is (example; a 69.9).

CAMPUS TESTING

During an examination, students are required to place all textbooks and personal property on the floor in front of the classroom. Students may be required to rotate seats prior to testing per instructions from the instructor. No talking is allowed once the exam begins. Students found with their cell phone or any other personal communication device during the exam will be considered cheating; which will result in a zero for the exam. All exams are timed with students receiving one minute to answer each examination question. An additional minute will be added per calculation exam question.

ATI ASSIGNMENTS

ATI assignments listed on the lesson plan must be completed with the required minimum score and 1 hour prior to scheduled exams. The required minimum scores for each ATI assignment is listed on *Summary of ATI Assignments* handout. Incomplete assignments, assignments without the minimum required score, and/or assignments completed after the deadline will result in a **10-point deduction** from the exam grade. Instructor will pull ATI reports at 8 AM for 9 AM exams. ATI records all module completions by student in real time.

ATI products will be integrated into each course according to the PN ATI Curriculum Matrix. The syllabi will outline when the student will complete each ATI assignment. Students are expected to complete each ATI assignment with the appropriate time, on time and with an achievement of the set benchmark according to the ATI matrix. The use of these products allows for formative and summative evaluations and assists the faculty in making the necessary changes to the curriculum.

ON CAMPUS TESTING

At this time, the nursing faculty plan to administer exams on campus. See below for details. If this process changes, the faculty will notify the student and send additional instructions.

- 1. Students will report to campus 15 minutes prior to the start of the exam. Students are to self-assess before arriving. Please refer to the COVID-19 symptoms listed on your syllabus. DO NOT come to campus if you are experiencing any symptoms, have a positive test or have a known positive exposure (per syllabus guidelines).
- 2. Students must wear a mask inside the buildings at all times. The mask will cover the nose and mouth. Maintain social distancing while in the building as well as when you enter and when you leave.
- 3. Bring a pen/pencil and only the minimal belongings you need; such as your keys. A calculator will be supplied through Respondus for calculations. Instructors will also give out the handheld calculators for student use. A sheet of paper will be provided for the exam. Make sure name is written clearly on scratch paper. The faculty member in your testing room will take up the sheet of paper at the end of the exam.
- 4. We will be testing using the Respondus web browser and Blackboard. (Instructor will provide building and room number for exam)
- 5. Outside the room, you will note a table and a sign in sheet. Please sign in and denote whether or not you performed the self-assessment. Once you have signed in you will enter the room. Please begin filling up the back row first, seat farthest from the door. Computer/chairs are marked off to ensure at least 6 feet of social distancing at all times. Do not rearrange furniture.
- 6. Make sure you use the restroom before entering the room. Students will not be allowed to get up and move about within the rows until dismissal at the end of the exam.

- 7. Remain seated until dismissed by the faculty.
- 8. Students are encouraged to leave the building immediately once dismissed. Remember to maintain social distancing.

MAKEUP GUIDELINES (EXAMS, QUIZZES, HOMEWORK, PROJECTS, SKILLS, ETC.)

In the event of an absence on an exam day, the instructor may require a physician's excuse before a student is allowed to take a make-up exam. A student will only be allowed to make-up one theory exam which will be given at the discretion of the instructor. A grade of "0" will be given to all subsequent exams missed. The make-up exam may or may not be the same as the original exam. It may also be a different exam format. If a student misses the final exam and has already used their ONE time make-up, the student will NOT be allowed to make-up the final exam and be given a zero for the final exam.

It is the student's responsibility to obtain notes, lecture recordings, or information presented in class when the student is absent.

ATI PROCTORED ASSESSMENT

Proctored assessments will be scheduled throughout different courses and given once 75% of the specific content is covered. The corresponding practice assessments A&B are to be completed prior to each proctored assessment. Remediation for proctored assessments is outlined below. All remediation must be hand written and is due at the end of the semester in which the proctored exam is given. However, remediation for proctored exams that are given during the final semester are due before the comprehensive predictor. Once the student has completed the remediation assignment and turned in to the instructor, the instructor will update the ATI remediation form found on the Q drive and return the remediation to the student. If the student fails to complete the remediation assignment prior to the comprehensive predictor, the student will be unable to take the comprehensive predictor and the attempt will be forfeited.

CALCULATION EXAM:

Students are required to take a calculation exam prior to attending clinical each semester as outlined on appropriate course syllabi. The student will have three attempts to score 100%. With each attempt a similar, but different exam will be given. The student will be allowed three minutes per problem. There will be a minimum of ten questions on the exam. The student will have one week between each attempt for remediation. Students will be allowed to use a standard calculator for the exam. No personal devices will be utilized for the exam. If a student is unsuccessful after three attempts; the student will receive a WP or WF for all PNSG courses in which they are enrolled and will not be able to progress in the program. If a student misses an attempt due to an absence, the student may forfeit the attempt and may take the next scheduled attempt. An absence on a third attempt may be evaluated on an individual basis. The importance of this is to promote safe medication administration in the clinical setting and reduce medication errors.

ATI CAPSTONE COURSE:

The ATI capstone course, an overall review of all subject material will begin in PNSG 2230 and takes six weeks to complete. The student will receive a calendar from the ATI virtual educator and must complete assignments by the due date given. Points are awarded according to the Points for ATI Capstone Grading Rubric. The ATI capstone course accounts for 10% of the grade in PNSG 2415.

Medical/Surgical (FA Davis) Online Resources

Completion of the Med/Surg. (FA Davis) Online Resources is highly recommended to help prepare you for exams and should increase your level of success in this class.

Student Success Plan

The Student Success Plan documents deficiencies in performance and provides a means for improvement. A success plan should be initiated for the following reasons:

- If the student has (1) a cumulative unit exam average of < 70% after the completion of 25% of the unit exams or (2) a skill(s) performance deficiency. The faculty will initiate individual counseling session and complete the Student Success Plan.
- If the student has (1) a cumulative unit exam average of < 70% after the completion of 50 % of the unit exams or (2) a skill(s) performance deficiency. The faculty will initiate individual counseling session, as well as review and update the Student Success Plan and submit an Early Alert.
- o If the student exhibits behavior outside the expected:
 - codes of conduct outlined in professional codes of ethics, professional standards,
 - All procedures/requirements/policies outlined in program handbooks/documents,
 - STC e Catalog and Student Handbook, and/or
 - Clinical facility policies and procedures.

The faculty will initiate an individual counseling session and complete an Academic Occurrence Notice and the Student Success Plan. The student success plan will be emailed to the student's STC email account by the instructor and the student should email the completed form back to the instructor by the designated date. (T)echnical College System of Georgia (E)arly (A)lert (M)anagement (S)ystem (TEAMS) & The Student Success Plan are designed to ensure that students are well informed about strategies for success, including college resources and assistance. ATTENDANCE Provisions Health Sciences

Requirements for instructional hours within Health Science and Cosmetology programs reflect the rules of respective licensure boards and/or accrediting agencies. Therefore, these programs have stringent attendance policies. Each program's attendance policy is published in the program's handbook and/or syllabus which specify the number of allowable absences. All provisions for required make-up work in the classroom or clinical experiences are at the discretion of the instructor.

Attendance is counted from the first scheduled class meeting of each semester. To receive credit for a course a student must attend at least 90% of the scheduled instructional time. Time and/or work missed due to tardiness or absences must be made up at the convenience of the instructor. Any student attending less than the required scheduled instructional time (90%) may be dropped from the course as stated below in the Withdrawal Procedure.

For this course, which meets 75 hours, the maximum number of hours a student may miss is 7.5 hours (7 hours and thirty minutes) during PNSG 2230: Medical Surgical Nursing III. Once instruction begins, all time missed will be counted in the total time of hours missed from class. When instruction has begun, there will be no class interruptions. The admittance into class during a lecture may occur after class breaks. This time will be calculated in with the total time of hours missed.

Attendance will be taken at the beginning and throughout the duration of the virtual lecture meeting. In order for the student to be counted present during class, the student must have video turned on and actively participating in the course.

It is strongly encouraged that requests for consideration be made PRIOR to delivery and early enough in the pregnancy to ensure that all the required documentation is secured before the absence occurs. Requests made after delivery MAY NOT be accommodated. The coordinator will contact your instructor to discuss accommodations when all required documentation has been received. The instructor will then discuss a plan with you to make up missed assignments.

WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURE Updated 11/2020

Students wishing to officially withdraw from a course(s) or all courses after the drop/add period and prior to the 65% point of the term in which student is enrolled (date will be posted on the school calendar) must speak with a Career Counselor in Student Affairs and complete a Student Withdrawal Form. A grade of "W" (Withdrawn) is assigned for the course(s) when the student completes the withdrawal form.

Students who are dropped from courses due to attendance after drop/add until the 65% point of the semester will receive a "W" for the course. Important – Student-initiated withdrawals are not allowed after the 65% point. Only instructors can drop students after the 65% point for violating the attendance procedure of the course.

Students who are dropped from courses due to attendance or academic deficiency after the 65% point will receive either a "WP" (Withdrawn Passing) or "WF" (Withdrawn Failing) for the semester and will be unable to progress in the practical nursing program. Informing your instructor that you will not return to his/her course, does not satisfy the approved withdrawal procedure outlined above.

There is no refund for partial reduction of hours. Withdrawals may affect students' eligibility for financial aid for the current semester and in the future, so a student must also speak with a representative of the Financial Aid Office to determine any financial penalties that may be accessed due to the withdrawal. A grade of "W" will count in attempted hour calculations for the purpose of Financial Aid.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY POLICY

PROCEDURE FOR ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

The procedure for dealing with academic misconduct and dishonesty is as follows:

1. First Offense

Student will be assigned a grade of "0" for the exam or assignment. Instructor keeps a record in course/program files and notes as first offense. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.

2. Second Offense

Student is given a grade of "WF" (Withdrawn Failing) for the course in which offense occurs. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus indicating a "WF" has been issued as a result of second offense. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.

3. Third Offense

Student is given a grade of "WF" for the course in which the offense occurs. The instructor will notify the student's program advisor, academic dean, and the Registrar at the student's home campus indicating a "WF" has been issued as a result of third offense. The Vice President for Student Affairs, or designee, will notify the student of suspension from college for a specified period of time. The Registrar will input the incident into Banner for tracking purposes.
